Pasco County Code Compliance—They are here for you

Your property taxes fund many county services. One of the least utilized is the <u>Code Enforcement</u> division. "The goal of the Code Compliance Division is to provide information to all interested parties and to fairly and efficiently enforce the Pasco County Land Development Code and ordinances."

Pasco County's Customer Service Center is the fastest, most efficient way to ask the Code Compliance division to look into a problem.

Beware, the County <u>does not</u> respond to anonymous requests; therefore the first step to submit ting a request is creating a "User ID" in the system. Creating your ID is super easy and takes less than 2 minutes!

Some examples under the category of Code Compliance include:

- Abandoned Animal
- Aggressive Dog
- Boats, Trailers & RV's
- Illegal Dumping of Trash or Debris
- Illegally parked commercial vehicle
- Inoperable Vehicle
- Overgrown Lots
- Trash and Junk

- Abandoned Signs
- Unsecured Pools
- Street Light Out
- Tree Low Hanging Branches near road
- Violation of permitted use
- Miscellaneous

Code Enforcement is there for YOUR benefit; you pay for it; use it.

May I have Your Undivided Attention!

Pasco County has informed the home owners association that the Digitized Flood Information Rate Maps (DFIRM) are changing.

Pasco county is a participant in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), and because they are, the residents of the county qualify for Federal Flood Insurance. The insurance

rates are based on risk assessment and the risk assessment is derived from the current DFIRM.

FEMA is publishing new Digitized Flood Information Rate Maps (DFIRM) and with those new maps, there is the potential your flood risk and associated insurance rate may change.

The Oak Ridge HOA received notification of the new DFIRM via a <u>letter</u> from the Pasco County Storm Water Department. That letter is packed with information,

links and meeting schedules to help you understand what impact the revised DFIRM may have on you. In addition to the letter, the Pasco County web page is a good information source to help you understand the potential impact to you and your insurance premiums.

Pasco County has planned 4 open house meetings that run 4pm—6:30pm as follows:

June 26, St Leo University 33574 SR 52 June 27, Zephyrhills High School July 10, Sunlake High School July 11, Wiregrass Ranch High School

The meetings will permit you review the revised DFIRM and to ask questions as to the impact the map change will have on your flood risk and associated insurance premium.

The Association will keep the News page updated with all the changes to help keep you informed.

POTAGER (po-ta-shjay) GARDENS-Bill Higdon, Master Gardener

Potager gardening is the practice of intercropping and companion planting of a variety of herbs, flowers, vegetables and even fruit trees. In fact, the word "potager" is actually a derivative of the French term for soup: everything needed to make a hearty soup that could typically be found in a medieval garden. These gardens can take many forms from formal gardens to

Intercropping and companion plantings is nothing new. The Native Americans practiced a method of gardening known as "the 3 sisters". This consisted of planting corn, beans and squash together. Corn provides support

for the beans, which fixed nitrogen into the soil and squash which acts as living mulch to help conserve moisture.

Potager gardens not only look great, but there is an increased level of biodiversity which makes everything healthier. Flowers increase the number and diversity of pollinators which will lead to greater yields, i.e. French marigolds are helpful in controlling

all types of nematodes. Another way to control nematodes is to improve the soil itself with organic matter. This allows the growth of certain fungi and predatory nematodes that can help keep root-damaging ones in check.

Sunflowers and nasturtiums can give a cottage feel to a garden. They attract aphids and can be used as decoys for vulnerable vegetables. Nasturtiums can deter cucumber beetles, whiteflies and squash bugs.

To be sure that what you plant is compatible, refer to the guides that are available at www.howtogardenadvice.com. Also refer to the Florida Vegetable Garden Guide at http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/vh021 for appropriate planting times for vegetables.
