"ABSTRACT: This permit authorization is for the modification of an existing surface water management system serving a drainage improvement project in south-

west Pasco County. The project is designed to improve conveyance in Duck Slough in an effort to alleviate upstream flooding. The area upstream from this project has had recorded flooding of homes and streets. The project consists of 2 parts identified as BMP1A and BMP 5A on the plans.

BMP 1A is located in Duck Slough between Mitchell Boulevard and Seven Springs Road, about 0.1 mile north of their intersection in Section 36, Township 26, Range 16. BMP1A consists of two 36-inch pipes with operable gates at the downstream end. The gates on BMP

1A are to be operated according to Duck Slough BMP 1A Operation and Mainte-

nance guidelines submitted to the District on October 28, 2013. The gates are to be opened only in anticipation of a significant rainfall event (i.e., an event that is expected to result in flood risk to upstream properties). The BMP 1A gates are to be closed at the onset of signifi-

cant rainfall and are to remain closed for the duration of that event.

Oak Ridge Homeowner's Association received clarification as to the impact the changes would have on the Oak Ridge Canal, which is the main canal that runs between Ridgetop Road and Coronet Drive.

Oak Ridge homeowners who live on

these streets should take particular interest in this project and its correct execution. It is the opinion of this Oak Ridge Homeowner's Association President that SWFWMD has done its due diligence in protecting 'down water' (that would be

Oak Ridge) from the Pasco Stormwater's planned changes. When Pasco Stormwater operates BMP1a per guidelines, Oak Ridge should encounter no change in existing water flow during a storm event.

Residents who live along Oak Ridge Canal: Although there are easements for access, you own it and must ensure that water way is clear of debris. You and everyone upstream depend on unobstructed flow to reduce the potential of flooding in a rain event.

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What's going on behind the CVS Drug store—By Mike Emanuel

Whats Going on Behind the CVS Drug Store?

The final phases of the Thousand Oaks / Trinity Oaks Flood Mitigation Project. Since this project has the potential to impact homeowners in Oak Ridge, your ORHA President and board members have been following its progress and attending public meetings to ensure that we are represented. Here are some of the highlights that might help you to quickly understand what the problem was, and what is being done to correct it.

- Pre-1978 The area now known as "Trinity" is scattered with wetlands that provide drainage by an East to West movement of water through Duck Slough, to the Anclote River and out to the Gulf of Mexico. The Eldridge Wilde wellfield is located in Pinellas County, on the Southern edge of the "Duck Sough Drainage Basin". There are concerns that years of pumping have started to diminish the wetlands.
- 1979 Oak Ridge is developed at the Western edge of the "Duck Slough Drainage Basin". Several natural creeks are expanded, including major widening of a creek that paral-

lels Duck Slough. This creek runs between Coronet and Ridge Top Dr. and terminates in a small pond with a weir that leads to the Anclote River. There is also a spillway that connects this pond to Ducks Slough if the water rises high enough.

- 1980's- mid 1990s Trinity Oaks and Thousand Oaks are developed to the East of Oak Ridge. Engineers purposely hinder natural flows through Duck Slough in an attempt to retain water and mitigate loss of wetlands due to pumping from the wellfields.
- 2003/2004 During El Nino storms, Trinity/Thousands Oaks get their first real floods, damaging streets so bad that Federal Disaster grants are used for repairs.
- 2005 Pasco County & SWFWMD hire consultants and map out a plan to mitigate flooding by restoring natural flow from Trinity / Thousands Oaks through the Duck Sough network of creeks to the Anclote River.
- 2011 Pasco County spends \$1 Mil to complete several remotely controlled gates and other control structures, but cannot get approval to deep-

en existing flow paths so the water can reach the gates.

- 2012 Tropical Storm Debby causes major flooding of streets and homes in Trinity/Thousand Oaks.
- 2013/14 Pasco County is granted approval to complete the deepening of existing flow paths and has started to complete the project.


The work behind the CVS Drug Store, along with the remotely controlled gates that have been installed in the creek that runs between Coronet and Ridge Top are key components in the County's Flood Management plan. Deepened flow paths will allow water to flow from the Trinity / Thousand Oaks neighborhoods, under Mitchell Blvd, behind the CVS, under Seven Springs Blvd and down the creek. The gates will allow independent control of water levels in the creek and in the ponds/wetlands of Trinity / Thousands Oaks. In anticipation of a major flood event, the gates can be remotely opened and water levels drawn down to limit the risk of flooding.

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Hummingbirds in our Backyard — By Bill Higdon

Hummingbirds live only in the Americas. There are 338 species known and 16 of them are found in the United States and three are found in Florida. The black-chinned and rufous hummingbirds can be seen occasionally in Florida. The ruby throated hummingbird is the most common hummingbird found in this state.

This name comes from the brilliant color of their throat feathers which contain air bubbles that give off an iridescent red tone in full light. Their backs

are metallic green and they have two sets of tail feathers: two green ones in the center that cover eight outer black ones when they're folded. In hens and juveniles, the black feathers have white tips, males lose the white tips as they mature.

Since the ruby throated hummer is the only one that breeds in Florida, this article will focus on their habitat and how to attract them.

In Florida, although some birds stay all winter, most males hummingbirds arrive in March and the hens arrive about a week later. They stay until September.

Their nests are made of plant down, lichens, moss and bound with spider web and plant fibers. The nest is the size of a walnut shell and they are frequently built over water.

Hummingbirds are well adapted to a liquid diet. Long needle like bills and specially adapted tongues allow them

> to reach nectar deep inside a flower (tubular flowers). They can lick up to 13 times a secare young, insects are an important part

of their diet and are used to feed babies. As they mature, they switch over to nectar but will still consume some insects.

For their size, they have some of the largest appetites in the bird world, feeding every 10 - 15 minutes from dawn till dusk.

Artificial feeders will attract these birds but should not be the only source of food for them. The sugar solution used to feed them does not offer much nutrition so having plants that provide nectar is extremely important. They will eat more than eight times their body weight in water and half their weight in food.

One bird may need nectar from nearly hundreds of blossoms daily to maintain their body weight.

Gardening for hummingbirds must be planned. They are drawn to the colors red, orange or pink. This attraction is learned and is not instinct. Tubular flowers that are either long or drooping are best. Blooming season is another important consideration. Nesting birds need nectar from March to September so it is best to plant a variety of flowers. Plant your flowers in different parts of the yard to create small humond. When they mingbird gardens because the males are very territorial and this will help eliminate fighting.

> Some plants that attract hummingbirds are as follows: Butterfly milkweed, pentas, shrimp plants, Red basil, passion vines, trumpet vines, firespike, hibiscus, and bottle brush. These are just a few of many.

Mix and match according to light reguirements. Remember to choose the right plant for the right spot.

New Sidewalk South of Collingswood Ct Entrance

A new section of sidewalk now connects the intersection of Seven Springs/Collingswood Ct to the refurbished sidewalk on the Pinellas County side. This is great news for those of us in Oak Ridge Phase III who have had to push our bikes along the side of Seven

Springs/East Lake Rd to get to the miles of bike trails that await in Pinellas county. Along with the widening of Keystone Rd, the PTKC (Pinellas Trial Keystone Connector) was also opened to allow safe hiking/biking all the way through to downtown Tarpon Springs, as well as completing the connection to the Pinellas Trail. Oak Ridge resi-

dents to the North still do not have continuous sidewalk on the West side of Seven Springs Blvd. They must cross over to the East side at the Perrine Ranch or Hideaway traffic signal, or they can ride down Copperfield and Ridge Top in Oak Ridge Phase III to make the connection.to the new sidewalk.

President's Corner— Emergency Services and your House Number

Membership means success

At the Annual members meeting you

heard a Pasco County deputy mention the importance of having your house number in a prominent location such that, when seconds count, emergency services isn't cruising right by your house because they can't see the number easily.

National Ambulance Service is calling for

the development of guidelines for the display of house numbers

and house names.

The minimum height for numerals and letters at 75mm, plain legible numbers or letters made from white or yellow reflective material are preferred, as red, blue or green can not

be easily seen, even with a spotlight at night. Ideally, numbers or letters

would be attached to a dark, non-reflective background or mounting plate as a light colored or reflective background can wash out numbers and letters, making them harder to read. Numbers and names should be displayed at the front of a property.
